Proverbs 6: 6 Go to the ant, thou sluggard; consider her ways, and be wise: 7: Which having no guide, overseer, or ruler, 8: Provideth her meat in the summer, and gathereth her food in the harvest. 9: How long wilt thou sleep, O sluggard? when wilt thou arise out of thy sleep? 10: Yet a little sleep, a little slumber, a little folding of the hands to sleep: 11: So shall thy poverty come as one that travelleth, and thy want as an armed man.

# GOD SHOW THYSELF!

Psalm 18: 25: With the merciful thou wilt shew thyself merciful; with an upright man thou wilt show thyself upright; 26: With the pure thou wilt shew thyself pure

From eternity, Christ became Surety of his people because he is the Merciful Man. He assumed our nature to bear our sin so that justice and mercy harmonize because he is the Upright Man. In order to be the last Adam, the only other man to begin life without sin that he might represent his people, he was born of a virgin declaring he is the Pure Man.

No mercy could be given Christ while he suffered the wrath of divine justice in place of his people. But satisfaction being made, redemption accomplished, God the Father raised him from the dead to his right hand along with all his people who he shall call to himself. Therefore, in God the Father's work toward Christ his Son and in Christ's work making us merciful, upright and pure in him, we see, "With the merciful thou wilt shew thyself merciful; with an upright man thou wilt show thyself upright; With the pure thou wilt shew thyself pure."

A man cannot depend upon Power and Grace which he has not been conquered by himself! Christ's preachers and people declare the gospel of God's Power and Grace to do everything in the salvation of his elect and they wait on God to quicken and call his people through the gospel because they themselves have been conquered by the Power and Grace of God through the preaching of that same gospel.



### A CAVEAT AGAINST UNSOUND DOCTRINES

Ask almost any man whether he hopes to be saved eternally. He will answer in the affirmative. But enquire again on what foundation he rests his hope. Here too many are sadly divided. The Pelagian hopes to get to heaven by a moral life and a good use of his natural powers. The Arminian by a jumble of grace and free-will, human works, and the merits of Christ. The Deist by an interested observance of the social virtues.

Thus merit-mongers, of every denomination, agree in making any thing the basis of their hope, rather than that foundation which God's own hand hath laid in Zion.

But what saith Scripture? It avers, again and again, that Jesus alone is our hope: to the exclusion of all others, and to the utter annihilation of human deservings.

Beware, therefore, of resting your dependence partly on Christ, and partly on some other basis. As surely as you bottom your reliance partly on the rock and partly on the sand, so certainly, unless God gives you an immediate repentance to your acknowledgment of the truth, will your supposed house of defense fall and bury you in its ruins, no less than if you had raised it on the sand alone. Christ is the hope of glory.

The preaching of the letter declares sinners can and must keep the law given at Mt. Sinai. One way the letter killeth is by sin deceiving men into thinking they can keep the letter of the law, as it once deceived the apostle Paul.
